Mahone Bay patio to stay, for now

MAHONE BAY - A controversial sidewalk patio on Mahone Bay's main street will remain in place while town council decides if they will rewrite the rules permitting such structures.

At the July 8 Town of Mahone Bay (ToMB) council meeting, Councillor Joseph Feeney indicated that he wants staff to explain to council and the community how and why the structure was approved.

He noted that the owner of Eli + Trix followed the prescribed actions set out by the town to build the patio, before making a motion for staff to come back with a report "on the permitting process for sidewalk patio installations, addressing questions concerning the approval process and design guidelines, and that this report be provided to the regular council meeting on July 31st."

A second motion asked staff to study the town's Streets and Sidewalks bylaw, which has been in place since 2008, and determine if it should be updated, and in

addition if sidewalk patios should be an independent bylaw.

That motion read "That council direct staff to prepare a report on potential updates to the 2008 Streets & Sidewalks By-law, including best practices from other Nova Scotian municipalities with bylaws governing sidewalk patios. The report should address the impact of sidewalk patios on pedestrian safety, provide design recommendations aligned with council's commitment to safety, and outline a consultation process for bylaw revision involving the MBTCC, local businesses, and residents."

Deputy Mayor Colin Kingsmill asked that the motion also include accessibility among the criteria being examined.

Councillor Feeney expressed his concerns that every resident should feel confident that they will receive due process and be given fair notice in their dealings with the town whether they are a business or a resident.

Said Feeney, "The permit in question did follow and complies with the existing bylaws and I do think that it's important for us to understand what the current rules are if

there's an expectation the rules can change, and that will be reviewed in due course."

Prior to making his motions, Feeney reminded residents that their correspondence will be included and taken into consideration during this review process and that the findings of these reports will be made public.

"I do think we need a fact-based report that is available to the community," said Feeney.

Council approved the two motions and will now await the staff reports which are scheduled to be presented at council's July 31 meeting. Council will discuss those reports before deciding if or how they may proceed with changes to the Streets and Sidewalks bylaw and the permitting of sidewalk patios.

Revisions to municipal bylaws are governed by the Municipal Government Act which sets out rigid timelines that allow for public input and consideration by council members. Municipalities must adhere to the rules which means the earliest the town could make any changes to the bylaw will be in the fall.

More than \$2.7 million investment announced for living coastline expansion

MAHONE BAY - The federal government, along with Coastal Action and the Town of Mahone Bay will be funding an expansion of the pilot project, to protect Mahone Bay's coastline.

In 2022 there was 60m of living coastline constructed on Edgewater Street as a pilot project, for protecting infrastructure in Mahone Bay. The project was considered a success, and construction of an additional 100m of coastline is set to begin in the fall.

Investments of \$2.7 million was announced July 4 at Mahone Bay's Michael O'Connor Bandstand.

Officials on hand to make the announcement were: Jessica Fancy-Landry, Member of Parliament for South Shore-St. Margarets, on behalf of the Honourable Gregor Robertson, Minister of Housing and Infrastructure and Minister responsible for Pacific Economic Development Canada; Mayor Suzanne Lohnes-Croft, Mayor of the Town of Mahone Bay; and Jordan Veinot, Climate Change Program Manager, Coastal Action.

Mahone Bay is vulnerable to flooding, coastal erosion, and contaminated stormwater runoff entering the harbour due to sea level rise, storm surge, and increased precipitation. To protect the town, Coastal Action, a non-profit environmental organization based in Mahone Bay, is leading a project that will reduce flooding and mitigate coastal erosion.

The project will include the construction of a living shoreline, a nearshore breakwater, a tidal wetland, and a raised dyke along 100m of Edgewater Street in Mahone Bay. A living shoreline is a stabilized, vegetated bank that uses native plants and natural materials to prevent erosion while supporting habitat.

An investment of \$928,000 from the federal government (Natural Infrastructure Fund), \$922,100 from Coastal Action, \$921,000 through the province's Growth and Renewal for Infrastructure Development program and \$16,950 from the Town of Mahone Bay.

Veinot is the climate change program manager at Coastal Action, she said "our project here the Mahone Bay Living Shoreline, is a nature-based solution aimed at protecting the town against climate change vulnerabilities and impacts. So, things like coastal erosion,

stormwater contaminant, stormwater running into the harbor and flooding," said in a media scrum.

The project also involves the planting of shrubbery and other vegetation in wetlands to help combat erosion; to help with this task the organization does

get help from the community to make it a true community project.

"The vegetative bank planting was something we did for the installation that we do for a lot of our other natural infrastructure installations. we find it beneficial for community members to get involved... and it fosters that kind of community, pride and advocacy for nature-based solutions in the community," says Veinot. Construction is expected to begin in the fall.

Annual Big Ex is right around the corner

BRIDGEWATER - The South Shore Big Ex kicks off July 20 and this year's event promises to be a fun-filled seven-day party with fun for all ages. This year's theme is Barn, Boots ... Country Roots.

The South Shore Exhibition started in 1891 and is the province's largest exhibition, featuring live music, rides, local and international horse and ox pulls, art and craft displays, 4-H display and 4-H light horse shows, food booths and trucks, vendors, seniors and kids resting areas, a petting zoo and so much more.

"It's part of our heritage," said Manager Carolyn Bolivar-Getson, who recently took over the post in April. "People book vacations around the South Shore Exhibition... there are people that walk through the gate that are well into their 90s and many of them haven't missed an exhibition."

She gave just one example of a lady that called her from Massachusetts.

"She said her roots were from Nova Scotia and her parents and grandparents always talked about the South Shore Exhibition and the international ox and horse pull," said Bolivar-Getson. "She said 'I am 80 years old, and my daughter gave me a trip as a present,' so she will be here this year."

She said that she, along with the board of directors and staff have been

working hard to make some improvements to the grounds for the upcoming exhibition and for the other events that are held on the grounds.

"We recognize that in order to maintain the South Shore Exhibition in our community that we need to put more dollars into infrastructure and into maintaining the grounds and keep it as a staple in our community," she said, mentioning that there has been a lot of painting, repairing and improving the facilities around the grounds.

"We're fortunate that it is not just the South Shore Exhibition that happens here. We are a community facility," she added, mentioning some of the events such as car shows, the SHAID yard sale and horse shows that the grounds are used for. "We have a dedicated team and everyone is taking ownership and working very hard."

One of the most exciting parts of the exhibition is the parade, that seems to get bigger every year. Once again,

often deemed the official kick-off of the exhibition, it will be held Tuesday at 6 p.m. starting at NSCC and winding its way through town. Full details can be found on their Facebook page.

Along with the parade, the ox and horse pulls are a great tradition. Bolivar-Getson says that this year's event is going to feature more animals than ever before.

Weigh-ins start on July 20 and pulls start on July 21 and continue through to July 26. The international horse and ox pull events will once again take place as Team Canada takes on Team U.S.A.

Midway rides and games are also a big part of the Big Ex experience. The midway will open July 23 at 1 p.m. and it will be toonie day as will Sunday, July 27 from noon to 5 p.m.

As of late last week, there were still some ride bracelets available for just \$32 at the main exhibition building or from 4-H members.

Lunenburg County man drowns in LaHave River

BRIDGEWATER - Monday morning at approximately 11:23 a.m., a 911 call came in reporting a possible drowning in the LaHave River in Bridgewater at King Street Court Park, off King Street in downtown Bridgewater.

Bridgewater Police Service, along with Bridgewater Fire Department,

EHS, Northfield District Fire Department, and Dayspring and District Fire Department responded to the call.

The individual who was believed to have drowned was subsequently recovered at about 12:40 p.m. as a result of a search of the area.

The deceased is an adult Lunenburg County man. His body was recovered with the assistance of the Bridgewater

Fire Department and the Northfield District Fire Department, and an underwater drone.

At this time, police believe there is no criminal nature to this incident and the investigation is being treated as an accidental drowning.

The Nova Scotia Medical Examiner's Office has been notified and will be assisting in the investigation.

A place... just to be

Teacher from South Africa creates a piece of paradise here in Nova Scotia

AUBURNDALE - Four years ago, my family and I left South Africa and immigrated to Nova Scotia in search of a quieter, more meaningful life.

After working as a Waldorf teacher for almost 20 years, I felt the need for something different, something with my hands, something with beauty, something that could grow. And so, I turned to baking and gardening.

When we moved into our property, the land was mostly just wild lawn and woods, but I saw potential in it.

Then, one day, I came home to find that Nova Scotia Power had cut down all the trees lining our road. At first, I was heartbroken. Those trees had become part of our sense of place, and their sudden absence was a shock. I stood there in the now open and exposed field, feeling stunned, and just let myself feel the sadness.

But then I looked up, and what I saw took my breath away. A wide, uninterrupted view unfolded before me; my neighbour's old farmhouse perched on the hill, looking rather grand and beautiful, with an ageing red barn tucked behind a fringe of trees, I'd seen it so many times before but never from this angle.

It felt like a gift. In that instant, something shifted. I believe deeply in finding the silver lining in every situation, and this moment reminded me that even in loss, there is always something new waiting to be discovered. That day became a turning point – I chose to focus on beauty, growth, and light.

I started with the land, digging, planting, shaping. I dug a small pond and began to coax a garden out of nothing. Originally, I dreamed of opening a little café where people could come and enjoy coffee and cake under the majestic oak trees. But as I worked, I realized that building a full café was more than I could take on alone, for now.

So I turned inward for the winter, mulled things over, and waited for the earth to thaw – literally and figuratively. And when spring came, a new idea

My hope is that the shop becomes more than just a place to browse and buy, it's a place to *be*. Visitors are welcome to sit under the big oak trees, breathe in the fresh country air, and listen to the birdsong. There's peace here, and a kind of quiet joy I've longed to share.

We're opening on July 12th, and I'm so excited to welcome the community. This space is a reflection of my journey – of resilience, reinvention, and beauty rising from the unexpected. I've poured my heart into every corner of this place, and I can't wait to see where it leads next.

All about the northern flicker

Bird Notes

Unfortunately, I have not had the chance to get out to do much birding recently. But one of those species that I am seeing frequently now, when I do get out is the northern flicker.

This species was once called the yellow-shafted flicker. They nest from the tree limit in Alaska, the Mackenzie, Manitoba, James Bay, Quebec, Labrador and Newfoundland and south to Baja California, Texas, the Gulf Coast, Florida, Nicaragua, Cuba, and the Grand Cayman.

They are a common breeder in Nova Scotia and they often spend their winters here, from near their northern breeding range south.

This woodpecker is 30 to 35 cm with a wingspread of 46.25 to 52.5 cm. Their back and wings are brown and they are barred with black. There is a black crescent across the upper breast with numerous round black spots on the side.

Both sexes have a red crescent on the back of the head. The male has a black malar stripe (moustache). There is a grey crown, brown face and throat and yellow underlinings of the wings and tail.

The northern flicker eats ants, which comprises about 45 per cent of their diet. They also eat beetles, wasps, grasshoppers, crickets, chinch bugs, wood lice, caterpillars, grubs, and various flying insects.

Twenty-five per cent of food is vegetative. This includes mostly wild fruits and berries of dogwood, Virginia creeper, hickberries, blueberries, pokeberries, serviceberries, elderberries, wild plums, and others.

They also consume seeds of clovers, grasses, pigweeds, mullein, ragweed, poison ivy and poison sumac. They will come to bird feeders for suet, bread, peanut butter mixture and otherwise.

Jason Dain reported four least sandpipers on Pearl Island on July 5. Sherri and Gary Selig observed a nightjar near Pernette Lake on the evening of July 6, likely a common nighthawk. They have been doing nightjar and Poorwill surveys for several years now.

Sherri and Gary are finding the weather not co-operative this year with consistent winds and the threat of electrical storms. I can relate to a change in weather patterns as each year with my three owl monitoring surveys, I'm finding it harder to get nights over a month period where the winds are low and the weather favourable.

On July 8 David Walmark was pleased to see a piping plover on Hirtle's Beach.

Is it an annoyance or an adventure?

Different people, as we know, prefer different things. Some people enjoy spontaneity; others view anything unplanned as chaos and confusion.

Dr. Glasser uses the term Quality World to refer to our collection of what we want the most. To use Choice Theory terms, we could say that a satisfied life is when the life we have largely matches our "Quality World."

How does a preference for order over chaos connect to our Quality World? If you want to live an orderly life, then you want reality to match your orderly, non-chaotic Quality World. You've

probably taken steps to make that happen.

While you may not have reached perfection in your endeavours, if you've made consistent efforts, then I suspect that you've had some success by controlling the things you can control.

What are the flies in this delightful orderly ointment? One of them, as you and I both know, is other people. So uncontrollable, don't you find? (And a good thing too, because if we could control them, then other people could probably control us.)

While we can work with people, treat them with kindness, offer them information, etc., ultimately they will do what they will do regardless of our

input, assistance, superior knowledge, and so on. And this can bring chaos to our otherwise orderly lives.

A second thing that can muss up our orderly processes is change. I'm not talking about those shiny coins in your pocket, but the inevitable 'progress' that interferes with things that are already working just fine, thank you.

If you have any technology, whether a computer, phone, tablet, even a TV or a vehicle, then you are already aware of the inevitable updates. What's the effect of an update? Sometimes, it's an improvement (yes, really, it can happen!) Other times though, the result of a change is that something that used to meet our needs just fine doesn't work anymore.

Now what? What's your immediate reaction when this happens for you? There are plenty of possibilities. Perhaps they include annoyance, fear, or anger. Our reality is out of balance with our Quality World and that causes a kind of pain, doesn't it?

Is there an 'antidote' to that pain? One suggestion that might help is to look at how we frame the situation. We may not have choices in whether the change happens, or how well or poorly it works, but we do have choices in how we view the outcome.

Whether the change is in technology or something else, try asking, "Do I

want to treat this change as an annoyance or an adventure?"

You could certainly argue that my suggestion is nothing more than a 'feel-better' panacea. It doesn't actually solve the problem; it just helps us to look at it differently. That would be correct.

However, our reality can be affected by how we look. The choice to use a perspective of adventure could help us take different, more productive actions than when we use a perspective of annoyance.

For example, looking differently could help us hold off on a frustrated argument with the spouse, not fly off the handle at a stranger, or stop yelling at the dog. Then, away from the heat of emotion, we may be more able to approach a situation calmly, even with a spirit of adventure.

We can't control the fact that things change, or that changes are often stressful, demanding attention and work. However, we may be able to exert control over our reaction.

plover at the Guzzle in Kings County. This is a very early sighting for this species.


